FORMATTING IS LIKE Setting the Table OBJECTIVE:

I can format an essay document in MLA style

Have you ever noticed that fancy meals have a standard way to set a table? Each person's place setting has the same dishes and tableware in the same tidy setup, and the table overall looks clean and coordinated (such as candles or flowers as centerpieces).

Restaurants and families put in that extra effort for a reason, such as making others feel welcome or impressed. Seeing a nice table can set the tone for the rest of the experience. If you set up your essay document correctly too, then your reader will appreciate it, too!

However, in writing, you can't just set the table however you want. (Save your personal expression for the writing itself!) As you know, all genres of writing have their own unique "look"; a newspaper looks different than a novel, and a letter looks different than poetry. There are social norms (genre conventions) for how an essay should look, too. If you don't follow those norms, then your ideas won't be taken seriously.

In proper dining etiquette, there are rules for what items are placed where. Likewise, in MLA Style, there are rules governing how your essay should look.

Just think:

If you are reading a letter, essay, or resume that's sloppy, what will you probably think about the writer?

PREVIEW

Is there a Formula to Good Writing? One English Teacher's Opinion

Most people can recognize good writing when they see it. Well-written essays have a certain flow, they are well-organized, they use good vocabulary, and their sides in the that perfect balance of explaining enough window going on volved. The question their becomes, if we can all recognize good writing, how can we create it?
