3. A statement that seems to contradict itself, but in reality expresses a possible truth. (paradox)
4. A three line poem about nature with a specific syllable pattern. (haiku)
5. When the arrangement of words creates an audible patter or beat when read out loud. (rhythm)
6. A funny poem with a strong beat and an AABBA rhyme scheme. (limerick)
7. A word that phonetically imitates, resembles or suggests the source of the sound that it describes.
(onomatopoeia)
8. Repetition of the initial consonant sound in words. (alliteration)
9. A lyric poem usually addressing a particular person or thing. (ode)
10. A device in which words, sounds and/or ideas are used more than once to enhance rhythm and to create emphasis. (repetition)
11. Repetition of consonant sounds in the middle or at the end of words; also known as near rhyme or off rhyme. (consonance)
12. A figure of speech that expresses resemblance between things of different kinds using 'like' or 'as'.
(simile)
13. When the writer or speaker repeats a word or group of words for effect. (repetition)
14. A contrast between appearance and reality.

Usually one in which reality is opposite from what it seems. When one thing is expected to happen or be and the exact opposite occurs. (irony)
26. A reference to a statement, person, place or event from literature, mythology, history, the Bible or the arts. (allusion)
27. When the writer uses line breaks meaningfully and abruptly to either emphasize a point or to create dual meanings. (enjambment)
30. Uses two nouns and compares or contrasts them to one another without using 'like' or 'as'. (metaphor)
31. An image that means something more than is shown. (symbol)
32. A saying that is so common it is no longer interesting. Many similes, metaphors and idioms are clichés. (cliche)
33. A type of poetry without rhyme and no set meter. (freeverse)
34. A fourteen line poem with ten syllables in each line. (sonnet)

1. A sudden striking realization or understanding of something, or an 'ah ha!' moment. (epiphany)
2. An accepted expression that has a figurative rather than a literal meaning. (idiom)
3. A poem that tells a story. (ballad)
4. A figure of speech in which an object or animal is given human feelings, thoughts or attitudes.

10. Words that paint a picture that appeal to your five senses. (imagery)
11. When the end or final sound of two or more words are identical. (rhyme)
12. A form of paradox that combines a pair of opposite terms into a single unusual expression. (oxymoron)

14. A recurrent element in a literary work such as a pattern or strand of imagery or symbolism. (motif)
15. Emotional response of the reader to the text. (mood)
16. A deliberate, extravagant and often outrageous exaggeration used for either serious or comic effect.
(hyperbole)
17. A central message or insight into life revealed through a literary work; a universal lesson about life or human nature. (theme)
18. A play on words that are identical or similar in sound but have sharply different meanings. It is used for serious or comic effect. (pun)
19. Writing that ridicules something, often in order to bring about change; satire can poke at a person, a group of people, an attitude or a social situation.
(satire)
